OUR NEW PASTOR

I was assigned to 13 parishes over 48 years. It is always a time to ask: what is the Holy Spirit saying in my heart as I fold the shepherd's tent and head out to pastures new? Here are my reflections of what is awaiting new pastors today.

I am aware that my early time as a pastor was different. Fr. Charlie told me that during his first years at St. Pius X, around 1973 that he had about 5 people at daily Mass and he wondered what would happen when they died. Then along came the

Cursillo movement and that number reached over 30. At that time, all young priests became involved in the new movements of the Holy Spirit: Cursillo, Core, Search, Engaged Encounter, Charismatic conferences and Marriage Encounter, and we experienced a revival in the parishes. What can we do today, with so many young and highly educated young priests, to bring forward "a new springtime" for parish life?

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- 1. It is important to be educated with awareness of this historical moment for the Church. We must recognize that Jesus has become a diminished figure in parish life when every Christian is called to be an apostle of Christ.
- An awareness that illness before death is one of God's blessing, encouraging us to be loving toward God and neighbour to the end. One of the great signs of a good parish is where people die holy deaths.
- 3. Baptism, First Communion and Confirmation must become more than folk religion. Young plants in the garden of the Church require personal cultivation.
- 4. Pope Francis speaks of Church life as a culture of encounter; where

- each parishioner is inspiring the others in putting love in the world; by sharing experiences of what the Holy Spirit can inspire us to do in the world, and especially in our families.
- 5. I would no longer see children and youth as a "problem" but "partners" in putting love in their families and in their schools. In my life we never asked this age group to put Christ's love in their families.
- 6. The Holy Spirit must become better known as the gift that Jesus offers us at every Mass; to accompany us in our professions and family life.
- 7. The Pastor must have a pastoral council that helps him listen to what parishioners are saying and that is aware that everything in parish life exists to bring forward

- the Kingdom of God.
- 8. Every Marriage must be celebrated as Christ establishing a new centre of love in the world. "Where two or more are united in my name, there am I in their midst". Matt 18: 20.
- 9. Many leave the Church because they do not have the gift of prayer. I inquire discreetly all the time if our children have the gift of prayer yet.

Let us live for a new springtime for the Church in our Diocese of Nelson.

A Fernie Ascension By Fr David John


The bell tower of the Catholic Church in Fernie is the highest point in the town, and from there one gets a simply magnificent view of the snow capped mountains that surround the town. So just five days before the feast of the Ascension, Bp. Gregory did the long



(and somewhat dirty) climb up the hundred year old wooden ladder that takes one up the church's tower, so he could ascend and be that bit closer to God.

Over the last few years there has been extensive renovation work done to the tower and to the seating of the single bell it houses. This bell has rung out over Fernie for more than a hundred years and has marked some of the great events in the life of Canada as well as more local history. At each wedding it is rung in joy, at each funeral it is solemnly tolled once for every year of the life of the person being commended to God, and every weekend it announces the celebration of Mass. It is so much part of the community.

Yet this bell is rarely seen close up because the climb up the tower isn't easy. There is one very narrow section, and one has to be quite agile to pull oneself up in places, but Bp. Gregory

Abundance of Gifts!

Jesus left them..., the apostles are hiding in the upper room on a holiday, called the feast of Pentecost or the feast of the wheat harvest. They feel abandoned, afraid, they are Today, Catholics and most Christians are in, an "upper room". It is very real. We are ashamed to say we are Catholic or even Christian. We too are lost, alone and powerless.

But remember, on that day, the apostles were filled with the fire of the Holy Spirit, a cornucopia of amazing gifts and a harvest of 3,000 souls.



This Lenten season, as happens every year, pilgrims around the world flock to churches, holy sites and shrines on Good Friday. They go to commemorate and experience, in their own way, the story of Jesus Christ's passion and death.

One shrine in our Diocese that continues to draw such pilgrims from BC, Alberta, and beyond is the life-size Stations of the Cross at Our Lady Queen of Peace Shrine in Radium Hot Springs, BC.

the known world, it was not possible for people to travel to Jerusalem to make the remembrance. The Franciscan priests began the practice of placing the Stations of the Cross around churches, where people could practice the devotion without travelling to the Holy Land. The practice of fourteen stations became standard in the 18th



century.

In 1969, a group of faithful parishioners from Our Lady Queen of Peach Church in Radium Hot Springs began a project to place life-sized statues, depicting the Stations of the Cross, on the mountainside above the church. The new St. Joseph's church was built in the early 90's and the statues were then moved to the present location. The shrine was blessed by Bishop John Corriveau in 2009.

With COVID in the rear-view mirror, the pilgrims returned this year. With

God's grace, may they continue to return, to pray and to experience Christ's passion at this Shrine for many years to come.



Meditating on the passion, crucifixion and death of Jesus has been a devotional practice of Christians for over a thousand years. Christians would walk the route that Jesus took on his way to Calvary and recall the events of His passion and death. As Christianity spread throughout

bedding, kitchen appliances, dishes, towels, bicycles, and clothing for newly arriving refugees settling in Kelowna. This has been an ongoing need throughout the year. One elderly Kelowna woman, who was recently widowed



in June, phoned in August to donate her entire household. She was moving to Ontario in Sept., had sold her home and decided after hearing of our project, to forego selling, her belongings, and donate everything to the Ukraine refugees.

During the Kelowna Rockets Hockey season of 2022 -23, club owners granted the opportunity host an **AID** UKRAINE DISPLAY in the main lobby of Prospera Arena during three home games. We crafted and organized two large display tables and poster boards displaying the reality of the war, the homeless and displaced families. children and soldiers.

We were blessed to collect \$3,000.00 towards the purchase of an **Ambulance Bus** being built in Europe, designed with a surgical suite and operating room equipment. This bus will travel to the bombed areas where hospitals and clinics have been destroyed, to provide medical expertise and care. Gabriele Geismayer, Patrick Lundeen and Eileen Collins manned these displays at the games, with Patrick displaying the winning smile to engage interest and donations.

Recently on May 7, the K of C of ICC granted the opportunity to host a display table at their monthly breakfast. Promoted earlier in all

parish bulletins, as STUFF THE BUS FOR UKRAINE, everyone was invited to bring donations of First Aid supplies, medications, burn cream, baby supplies of formula, diapers, blankets, sleeping bags and suitcases, (which are used to ship the First Aid supplies). We were overwhelmed to receive a truck load of these items. The biggest surprise was receiving four large boxes of First Aid supplies from the Girl Guides. I don't know who specifically to thank, but a huge thank you to that troop for your generosity and compassion. Funds of \$780 and supplies were delivered that afternoon to Fr. Pavlo Myts. pastor at the Dormition of Mary. He expressed tremendous appreciation for all this support.

CWL Fernie: Centennial Celebration

The Catholic Women's League (CWL) in Fernie celebrated their centennial anniversary last Nov. 5, 2022, with a church service and banquet.

Celia Roccamatisi, past president of the CWL and master of ceremonies for the Saturday celebration, said their motto

is 'For God and for Canada', and that their objectives have been to deepen faith, do service, and attain social justice.

The CWL was organized nationally in June, 1920. Fernie was the first charter in B.C. and the ninth in Canada.

"We are celebrating the centennial. We are having it a little later because COVID delayed our celebration, and I thought it was important to organize one, because we are with the original charter. And out of respect for the women who signed the original charter, I just thought that we should have a celebration,"

Roccamatisi said.

The evening started with Mass at the Holy Family Church, followed by a dinner attended by a broader group at the Family Centre. There were about sixty people in attendance throughout the celebrations, which featured speeches, socializing over cocktails and coffee, a full ham and turkey dinner, and a musical performance.

A write-up, prepared by the CWL, was placed at everyone's dinner seats. It explained some of the history of the organization and named the signers of the original charter.

The original Charter says the Holy Family

Church was built by the men of the parish from 1909 to 1911, and is viewed as the primary heritage Catholic Church for B.C.

It adds that on the provincial and federal level, members serving on resolution committees have caused some resolutions to become legislation.

The write-up goes on to say that on the parish level, league members have focused on the immediate spiritual, social and financial needs of the parish.

"The Pastor has always needed assistance to evangelize, to minister the sacraments and to bring parishioners together to socialize. Particularly, in the early years of the parish, the church, was the social center of the parishioners' lives, having teas, dances, pageants, suppers, and luncheons frequently hosted by the CWL Council. These events have helped

with the financial management of the parish."

Roccamatisi said that 100 years is a long time, but that it passes quickly.

Holy Cross Soup Community Kitchen in Creston BC

We began our sit down community soup kitchen in September 2018. In 2020, it was shut down, as everything was, due to Covid. We put word out that we would deliver lunches, thinking we would have about fifteen - twenty lunches to deliver.

We have always put Jesus in charge of our soup kitchen, and He very clearly showed us what was needed in our community, which is meals delivered to our shut-ins and those who cannot afford the meals on wheels program and cannot cook for themselves. The list grew to 100 deliveries in two weeks. We realized that his was the greater need in our community.

We are part of the ministerial association in Creston and so we put word out at the next meeting that we would be needing extra hands. (There are seven different denominational churches who make up the Ministerial Association) The response was tremendous. Many helping hands came forward and delivery drivers as well, all volunteers.

The soup kitchen consists of six "teams" who rotate every six weeks, doing the cooking and packing of the soup, a bun, some fruit or veggies and a treat. There are also three teams of drivers, consisting of eight people each week who rotate through a three week schedule doing all the deliveries.

We receive referrals for people needing

the soup lunch from some community organizations, from Interior Health as well as friends and families referring their loves ones.

Our community soup kitchen has really been an obvious example of being the hands and feet of Jesus. We (the different churches) have come together, putting our differences aside, to work TOGETHER as a community, running this project through our united love for our one God and for one another!

We would like to extend a BIG THANK YOU this year to Ex Corde Foundation as wellas Mazon Canada fortheir contribution of \$5000 and \$2340, respectively. We run the soup kitchen completely on donations and with volunteers.

It would not be the great success it is without financial help from these foundations and from other private donors in our community: like the Golden Flour Bakery, Gleaners Food Bank, Dairy Queen, Demetri's Catering, and of course, without all the volunteers who help prepare the soup, package the lunches, deliver the soups, clean the kitchen, and the hall floors, pick up the buns and food from Gleaners and so the list goes on. Without them, this successful ecumenical community soup kitchen would not be. It is ALL of these generous contributors who make this happen. We want to thank all from the bottom of our hearts!

Below are a few testimonials we have received from various volunteers, some from our parish and some from other churches and the community. Please pray



for our soup kitchen, for all those who receive soup and for all those who help make it happen.

I am one of the soup team leads as well as coordinator of the deliverers. I have also delivered our soup lunches to the most vulnerable in our community. From my several years of experience in this endeavor, I can say unequivocally that this activity not only has brought our churches together to work ecumenically but it has also drawn other people in our community to volunteer alongside us.

However, until you actually meet the 'shut ins', the physically and mentally impaired, the frail and the aged, you don't realize how destitute and needy people are as they are the silent minority. A smile and the comfort of some small amount of food can brighten their day and we become more compassionate people through the giving."

I am a volunteer driver for the soup kitchen program that delivers meals to various people in the community. My job simply is to deliver the prepared food once every 3 weeks. I arrive at the Holy Cross Church, who facilitates this charitable program, pick up the prepared meals, and deliver to those assigned to me at a specified time.

I am grateful for the kind souls who volunteer to make sure this program continues week to week. My part is easy about one hour per month. Those who take are of the program are the real heroes. May God bless them, and continue to give them strength as they give of their time to help those who need it. *Continued on page 18...*

I find the people I work with in this program to be thoroughly prepared, very kind, and selfless. It is an honor and a privilege to be able to support this program in my small way.

The people I deliver to have a need for this program, and are so very grateful every time I drop off the prepared food packages to them.

I hope this program will continue for as long as people live in our beautiful valley. When we are in the service of our fellow beings, we are only in the service of our God.

As a soup maker for this program, I am happy to say we are able to fill the need for feeding people and showing love to them through food and kindness. To show them God's love through our many hands that work this program.

We encountered a lovely 88yr old, who was struggling to start her snowblower after a big snowfall. We were able to help start it, then clear her driveway. We continue to have regular wonderful conversations, and the program is so appreciated. She has limited vision and her husband is recovering from a stroke, and this is one of the programs that make it possible for them to remain at home.

A client has mobility and communication issues. She is so happy when we arrive. She does not have to let us in. So we put her soup in a cup and into the microwave, for her to heat later. I have noticed an improvement in her appearance and her mood lately.

One week a client was struggling with installing a wireless doorbell when we arrived. We were able to finish the job, and we had a lovely conversation. She told me she cannot cook anymore, as she forgets to turn the stove off, so she relies on these programs.

We had a new client on our list, and there was no answer when we

arrived. The only number available was her reference, and when we called she assured us that we could leave the soup outside and she would conduct a wellness check. This is an invaluable service, and we are so happy to be a part of it.

My name is Bob Leduc and I have a working relationship with Helen and the Catholic Church as a funeral director. I know Helen is quite involved with the soup kitchen and other community services. Helen walked us through the process; what was required of volunteers including the needed police checks and food preparation requirements. We have assisted in our joint community efforts participating in the delivery and preparation of soup lunches to the members of our community. This has been a wonderful blessing for our church members to interact with different volunteers, church groups and to those in need. The program reaches out to those individuals at a very difficult time.

It has been my personal joy to see the many faces of those who have benefited from this truly giving program on so many levels. One story that shines a light on the service was when I was delivering the lunches on Boxing Day. One of the recipients had answered the door and was absolutely bewildered that we are still out delivering the lunches on holiday. She was so very grateful for the interaction and contact that I believed was the best part of her day.

Each Monday as we send out a bowl of soup, bun and sweets to shut ins in our community. This might seem small but I think it really makes a difference in their lives to have the lunch and a small visit.

As Volunteers, we love what we do for the Soup Kitchen. It's wonderful to be a part, however small, of a great group of people who bring comforting bowls of soup to those who are alone or in a difficult situation.

CRANBROOK CATHOLIC PARISH OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Joint Parish Outreach Program is celebrating its 25th Anniversary in 2023! As we remember this important anniversary, we want to help our parishes remember how this all started and to recognize the work that has been done over these last 25 years to make this program a place of joy, safety, and hope for those living on the margins.

In the mid 1990's Fr. Ken Forster OMI, often helped men and women who came to St. Mary's rectory looking for food and often a listening ear. This desire to reach out to those in need was the genesis of the current program. In the early years, the food was distributed out of the basement of St. Mary's rectory, supported by parish members who filled the hampers and handed them out.



While this humble beginning offered a small hamper of food, something was lacking. After discussion and prayer, it was decided that a more social environment would provide not only food support but also provide a warm and accepting atmosphere for folks. They could get their food hamper but also stay and have a coffee and chat with the volunteers. Over time, a hot breakfast was added, and the ever-ready supply of coffee provided a place for the volunteers and participants to meet and develop relationships in a non-judgemental space. At the height of the program, up to 90 hampers a month were distributed.

Various parish members would do the bulk shopping and then take the food to the Church for the Sunday sale. The youth learned not only important life skills while managing the food sale tables but became aware of the needs in the community. During the offertory procession, families and individuals would bring their food contribution forward and place it before the altar as a very visible symbol of our

commitment as parish to those living with less.

Christmas was and remains to this day a special event at Outreach. Parish members donate gift

cards, cold weather supplies such as socks, mitts, hats, and scarves as well as much needed personal care items. St. Mary's School is also a supportive The older students provide partner. home-made Christmas cookies for every client while the younger grades make Christmas place mats with messages

of love and support. An amazing breakfast plus our musical group makes this morning a joy filled event. The homemade cookies and the simple messages of love and support bring smiles and some tears to the faces of those coming to the Christmas breakfast they



remember and share memories of Christmas past.

Come With Your Power and Might Conference

On April 21st and 22nd, 2023, one hundred forty, plus, participants gathered at Our Lady of Lourdes parish in West Kelowna to take part in the Annual Nelson Diocesan Renewal Conference. These participants came from all over B.C. and Alberta to take part in the rosary, talks, meals, testimonies, Praise and Worship music sessions and sharing of the Prophetic Word. Childcare was provided so young parents could be free to participate.

Fr. Sylvester "Obi" Ibekwe, pastor of St. Anne and St. John Vianney parishes in Penticton was the featured speaker. Jesus is the one who saves us, redeems us loves us; He is the "splendor" of the Father.

Father said that we often hear "the young are the future of the Church". But the truth is "The young are the NOW of the Church." Jesus is the GOD of today and He dwells in the praises of His people. The Church is alive and when we gather, the kingdom grows. God speaks in the darkness and whatever He touches becomes new. Father Obi used the image of a canoe and said the young do the rowing and the older laity chart the direction by the stars: he exhorts us to "row together'. Wherever we go, Jesus is already there. His word is new every morning; He makes all things beautiful in its time. We need to ask the Holy Spirit to fill us with the Spirit of the Risen Jesus like those disciples on the road to Emmaus; may Jesus set our hearts on fire! He invites us to friendship with Him, a real encounter, especially daily mass. He will renew our zeal for prayer, Father Obi said, and will begin renewal of the kingdom in our parishes. At mass we go from Calvary to the Resurrection. Each mass we go on "mission"; we need to come to the font as adults, to "rise" from the waters of the Jordan river, as Jesus did, and hear the Father say to us, "This is My beloved son, with whom I am well pleased." One mass can change the world, was the message Father Obi gave.

He quoted Pope Paul VI who said, "Modern man doesn't listen to teachers; we must become witnesses." We need to tell the world the reason for our hope, declaring His works, for there is nothing greater than friendship with God. Because of the free gift of the Sacrament of Confession, won for us by the blood shed on the Cross, we can be redeemed, saved, loved and forgiven.

And so we hear the voice of Jesus, once again, as when He raised Lazarus from the dead, brought the daughter of Jairus back to life and healed the paralyzed man lowered down on the stretcher, "Rise, let us be on our way." Amen.

OUR MODERN DAY LEPERS?

"Now there were four men with leprosy sitting at the entrance to the city gates. "Why should we sit here waiting to die?" 2 Kings ch.7 v. 3

The lepers of the Bible were people who were feared and shunned and left helpless until they died. As we look back at the people's reaction to this disease and these wounded people, we may have a tendency to judge those who treated the lepers so badly. Yet, if we look at the modern day wounded who live on our streets, can we claim to be innocent of fear or shunning?

I look back to a time, 20 years ago, when I clearly avoided and feared those men who lived on the streets, who approached and begged, or just looked up from the concrete with sad eyes. I knew nothing of their plight or traumas, and fear of the unknown can be the worst.

But then, in 2002, I was invited to get involved in developing a new project, Freedom's Door, an addiction and mental health recovery home for men in Kelowna. I went into my first meeting with trepidation. I entered a room with ten guys who looked rough and tough. I came away from their morning prayer and proverb session with a great sense of comfort. What a transformation in knowledge and empathy for these

suffering souls who were simply seeking sobriety and acceptance.

Now, two decades later, Freedom's Door has grown from humble beginnings to a very successful long term and live in program. During the past 20 years we have served over 2000 men. Our approach is faith based and utilizes the 12 Step Program of Alcoholics/Narcotics Anonymous. We have learned that there is no quick fix and each person needs to be dealt with based upon his own personal, mental, physical, emotional and spiritual needs. No "cookie cutter" approach here. An in depth look at each person's traumas, addictions and mental health issues must be a part of the healing process.

Although everyone's experience was unique and painful, we listened, shared stories, and related to one another on a deeper emotional and spiritual level. We supported each other as we cried, laughed, and prayed all weekend. It

was like nothing I had ever experienced before. After many months of pain, loneliness, and despair, I was finally able to accept God's Mercy. I could see this was all meant to be, and He was there guiding me through it all. Jeremiah 29:11 states "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future".

The RV retreat was a tremendous opportunity that I cherish deeply; it was an experience that has touched my soul and brought me back to my Faith. I am eternally grateful for the organization and the amazing team for operating such an essential sanctuary. I have unlocked this new devotion in my life and through Christ, I can live a fulfilled life and support others in their journey. Rachel's Vineyard is a one-of-a-kind experience and I highly recommend anyone going through this loss to seek God's forgiveness and Mercy – Rachel's Vineyard can help you do that.

Based upon Statistics Canada there are 235,000 people living on the streets of Canada. Sadly about 75% of these people suffer from mental health issues. There are inadequate services available to them. When they do receive treatment in our hospital's emergency wards, they are simply sent back to the streets, as they have no home. There are very few detox centers and recovery homes.

Jesus told us to love our neighbors as ourselves. Are the homeless people

our neighbors? Each of us needs to examine our attitudes when dealing with these wounded neighbors. Or do we just conclude that they are outcasts?

At Freedom's Door so many men have received healing through a God centered approach. Faith can overcome fear and faith commands us to love those most in need.

"Large crowds followed Jesus as he came down from the mountainside. Suddenly, a man with leprosy approached him and knelt before him. "Lord", the man said, "If you are

willing, you can heal me and make me clean." Jesus reached out and touched him. "I am willing," he said. "Be healed." And instantly the leprosy disappeared. Matthew 8. V. 1-3




interview with Abby Johnson was shown. She shared her personal story, as the

11 You turned my wailing into dancing; you removed my sackcloth and clothed me with joy,

The word wailing on verse 11 encloses a crying with anger, sadness, and grief, yet God promises us to turn these emotions into joy!

We may not understand the reason behind the situations we face every day but one thing we know is that God will never let us fall; our Father is always ready to extend His arms for us.

Throughout this season of my life I have learned that praying should not be fully about what we want or expect from God to do in our lives, but on aligning the desires of our heart to what God has already planned for us (Jeremiah 29:11).

11 For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD,
